





Black and Female Essays by Tsitsi Dangarembga

In Black and Female, Tsitsi Dangarembga examines the legacy of imperialism on her own life and on every aspect of black embodied African life. This paradigm-shifting essay collection weaves the personal and political in an illuminating exploration of race and gender.



Once I Was You by Maria Hinojosa

In Once I Was You, Maria shares her intimate experience growing up Mexican American and documenting the existential wasteland of immigration detention camps for news outlets that often challenged her work. She offers a personal and eye-opening account of how the rhetoric around immigration has not only long informed American attitudes toward outsiders but also enabled willful negligence and profiteering at the expense of our country's most vulnerable populations.



Strong Female Lead: Lessons from Women I Power by Arwa Mahdawi

Women have been taught to "lean in" and act like men to get ahead, but as the financial, environmental, and social systems crumble. But while some at the top are telling us "it is what is it," there's a new generation of leaders showing the world how to be better. They're building trust, investing wisely, and acting decisively.
